






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### **Greetings** from the Board of Directors

### 2023 has been a mixed year for BIAG.

It started off promising with our Dream Big: Stroll and Roll Festival work held in March in Woodstock. It was the first opportunity for BIAG to hold a walk in three years. We had a last-minute venue change. However, there were numerous participants along with a sense of excitement for future walks.

A couple of months later, in May, our THINK BIG 2023 conference was held at the Shepherd Center. Again, it was the first opportunity in three years for BIAG to host this type of event. It was a success, and we appeared on a path back to "normal."

However, a month later In June, BIAG lost one of its champions, Roger Brathwaite. Roger was the founder of the Young and Restless in Atlanta Stroke and TBI Support Group. He also served as the Vice-chair for the BIAG Board of Directors in 2023 at the time of his passing. We are still heartbroken for our loss.

In those tough moments, it is often the precise thing to direct one to reflect on BIAG's mission.

However, BIAG needs more resources. Primarily, those resources need to be financial. We need adequate funding to implement the plans that our heads, and our hearts, desire to do for these incredible people. Nowhere was that made more evident this year than with Camp BIAG.

Camp BIAG is a unique overnight camp experience designed specifically for adults (18+) with a brain injury. Camp BIAG is the most complete and cost-effective recreational and therapeutic program in the Southeast focused on the special needs of the brain injury community. There is no charge for the survivors to attend.

Unfortunately, BIAG had to make the extremely difficult decision to cancel this signature event due to the potential financial strain on the organization. That was a crushing blow. One which no one associated with BIAG ever wants to repeat again.

With that in mind, the staff and board of BIAG are resolute in our approach to 2024. We are focused on fundraising efforts to allow this organization to reach its proper and fullest potential. The people we serve deserve no less than that.

In a sense, 2023 was a year for BIAG to have a mirror experience to the lives of the people it serves. A step ahead along with an occasional setback. An understanding that things will never quite be "easy" but always determined to make a way regardless.

We hope that you will partner in this difficult journey as we navigate. Any help you can provide will support a population of incredible individuals with some of the greatest needs.

### Who We Are

### **OUR MISSION**

Our mission is to provide hope, help, and support to the citizens of Georgia who have sustained or been affected by brain injury.

Brain Injury Association of Georgia (BIAG) is dedicated to increasing access to quality health care and raising awareness and understanding of brain injury through prevention, education and advocacy.

Together with its network of affiliates as well as support groups throughout the State of Georgia, BIAG is the VOICE OF BRAIN INJURY in Georgia for individuals, their families and the professionals who serve them.

### **OUR PURPOSE**

BIAG connects people coping with brain injury to vital resources and to help navigate the road of rehabilitation and beyond.

Our Board of Directors is comprised of survivors, volunteers, and professionals from the Georgia brain injury community.



BIAG is a non-profit organization serving individuals with brain injuries and their families, friends, and service providers. Founded in 1982, we strive to improve the quality of life for people with brain injury and their family and friends through our programs and services.



### Program Highlights

### Resource Facilitation for TBI Survivors

The Resource Facilitation Program is made possible through an Administration for Community Living (ACL) grant awarded to the Brain and Spinal Injury Trust Fund Commission (BSITFC). BIAG partners with BSITFC supporting individuals affected by a traumatic brain injury statewide.

BIAG has expanded our staff to support the program and developed a new database for reporting on this grant funded program.



### **Community Events**

BIAG hosted its first in-person fundraising events in three years.

March: Dream BIG: Stroll and Roll Festival for Brain Injury Awareness Atlanta. This event included a 2+ mile course for runners, a 1 mile for path walkers and wheelchair "rollers" and tons of crafts and family fun! We all wore our favorite superhero outfit (t-shirt, cape). Also, that day was the 12th Annual Brain Injury Awareness Roll, Walk, or Run in Augusta.

May: 3rd THINK BIG conference, focusing on those TBI survivors who are underserved and underfunded and discussing the connection between brain injury and those who experience intimate partner violence (IPV), human trafficking (HT), and the criminal justice system. Over 100 case managers, social workers, physicians and nurses, psychologists, occupational, speech/language, physical, and recreation therapists attended this cooperative offering from both Shepherd Center and the Brain Injury Association of Georgia.

June: 1st Annual Swing BIG FOR Brain Injury Awareness Golf Tournament at Top Golf in Midtown Atlanta.

# Advocacy and Education

As an affiliate chapter of the Brain Injury Association of America, we mobilize volunteers, lobbyists, support groups and special interest groups to partner with BIAG in actively advocating for legislation affecting the disability community.

In 2023, our Executive Director, Cassandra Palmer, along with our Board members, met with community supporters such as the Joe Nieko Foundation, the ADRC Advisory Council, the ADRC Elder Rights Advisory Council, attended the Latin American Association Health Expo, and began a new collaboration with the Shepherd Center on a TBI Employment Grant award.

In addition, Cassandra represented BIAG at ATL Veterans Admin TBI Day, Gwinnett County BOE Special Education Transition Day, and the Rural Health Association conference. On a national level, she traveled to Washinton, DC for the NASHIA Seed Summit and Capitol Hill Day, and met with Georgia elected officials for funding requests for 2024 appropriations meetings.

Board member and TBI survivor attended the annual BIAA conference, representing all of Georgia.



The Brain Injury Association of Georgia (BIAG) connects people with a Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), their families, caregivers, and community with tools to navigate medical and general life challenges after a TBI. Our staff of Resource Facilitators provide education and resources to improve coping skills following TBI by connecting individuals with needed supports including information, education, and resources provided. The Resource Facilitation Program (RFP) is a free service offered to citizens of Georgia in conjunction with the Brain and Spinal Trust Fund Commission. RF Specialists assist TBI survivors with applying for a BSITFC grant, through the RF Program.

BIAG Staff apply the same RF Program resources and support model for callers with non-traumatic, acquired brain injuries (ABI) and undiagnosed cases, minus the BSITFC grant program for TBI survivors.





Camp sessions are called lifechanging by our campers.

Across the country, more than 5.3 million children and adults live with a disability related to a brain injury—that's 1 in every 60 people. Each year in the state of Georgia, there are over 35,000 new traumatic brain injuries and 25,000 strokes, making brain injury a leading cause of both death and disability in our state.

### Who We Are

**BIAG is the state's only statewide non-profit organization dedicated** to providing prevention, research, education, advocacy, and support services to people affected by brain injury, their families, healthcare providers, and the general public. We greatly appreciate the generous contributions from individuals and businesses that allow us to provide hope, help and support to the thousands of people throughout Georgia who live with the life-long and devastating effects of a brain injury.

- BIAG is the designated service provider for the State of Georgia Aging and Disability Resource Center. Because we are considered the state experts in brain injuries and have a dedicated database of resources, all contacts received concerning brain injury or dual spinal cord injury are routed to our Information and Resource Program Facilitators who are Certified Brain Injury Specialists (CBIS) and Options Counselors, providing assessments for Medicaid, waivers, food stamps, and other state programs.
- BIAG offers **Resource Facilitation Programs** specifically designed for people with traumatic brain injuries (TBIs), their families, caregivers, and community to navigate medical and general life challenges after a TBI. This program includes an initial consultation as well as ongoing support for up to two years. Program features include person-centered goal setting, education about TBI and coping techniques, along with connection to community support, disability services, Medicare waivers, and resources.
- BIAG maintains a toll-free **helpline and website** to ensure that all people with brain injuries, their loved ones, and professionals are directed to the appropriate program, resource, or service.
- BIAG has a statewide network of Support Groups which provide on-going healing and peer support for their lifelong
  journey of brain injury. Our support groups are the backbone of BIAG, and are led by trained health care providers, survivors
  of brain injury, and caregivers.
- BIAG features several Brain Injury in Georgia (BIG) annual and biennial education, outreach, awareness, and celebratory events, each of which also offer their own sponsorship opportunities. See sponsorship handouts for more details of this year's offerings.

#### **Who We Serve**

### What is Brain Injury?

Acquired brain injuries (ABIs) are a wide range of changes to the brain as a result of accidents, diseases, infections, or other incidents. Brain injuries broadly fall into one of two categories: traumatic and non-traumatic. Traumatic includes injuries from things like falls, motor vehicle crashes, being struck by an object, assault, blasts, or other causes. Non-traumatic injuries include a wide range of diseases and other incidents, such as strokes, aneurysms, brain tumors, infections like meningitis, or loss of oxygen to the brain.
